Store Uses Billboards To Promote Karastan

Depicting the soft lustrous texture, delicate designs and shimmering colors of an Oriental rug design in a painted billboard advertisement is not easy, but H. and S. Pogue of Cincinnati, Ohio did it recently to call attention to Karastan's power-loomed Oriental patterns.

Pogue's considers the two billboards boards for advertising for the past eight years to call attention to storewide promotions or spotlight specific items or brands. The Karastan rug, however, was the first time floor coverings was featured. Only items or brands that are, like Karastan, exclusive with Pogue's in Cincinnati are featured.

On the boards, Pogue's showed Karastan's rug No. 762 and featured the same pattern in windows and interior displays in the store itself.

Pogue's considers the two billboards (subject of which is changed monthly) of inestimable value. They are located at entrances of the city, one of them being on the direct route from the Greater Cincinnati airport to downtown Cincinnati.

Response from the Karastan boards was so successful that Mr. Harry Gallagher, Pogue's rug buyer, advises the store will again feature Karastan on its outdoor signs from October 15 to November 15, 1956.

Cunningham Named Asst. Superintendent
