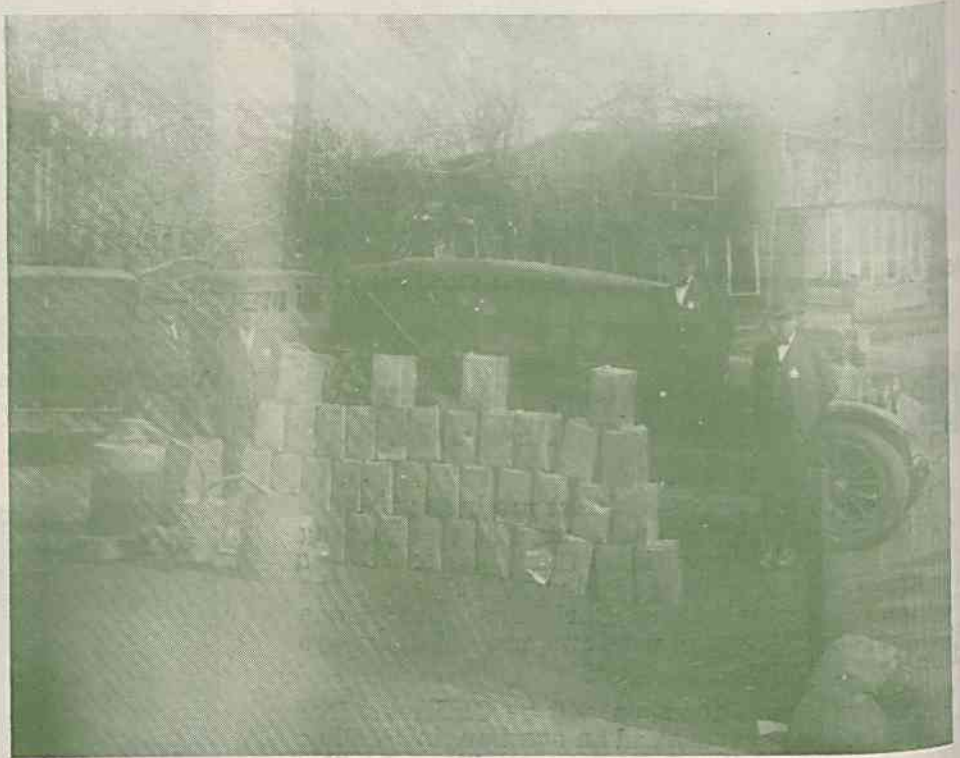
## Cake Cutting

non was a gate guard at Karastan before his death a few years ago.
