The listing of the quality weavers is part of a program at the Blanket Mill designed to emphasize the importance of quality weaving and to give recognition to weavers with outstanding records.

In order to make the quality honor list, a weaver must work for six months without a major quality defect.

When a weaver on the list has a major quality defect, his name is dropped from the list. Other weavers are added as they attain six months of quality work.
