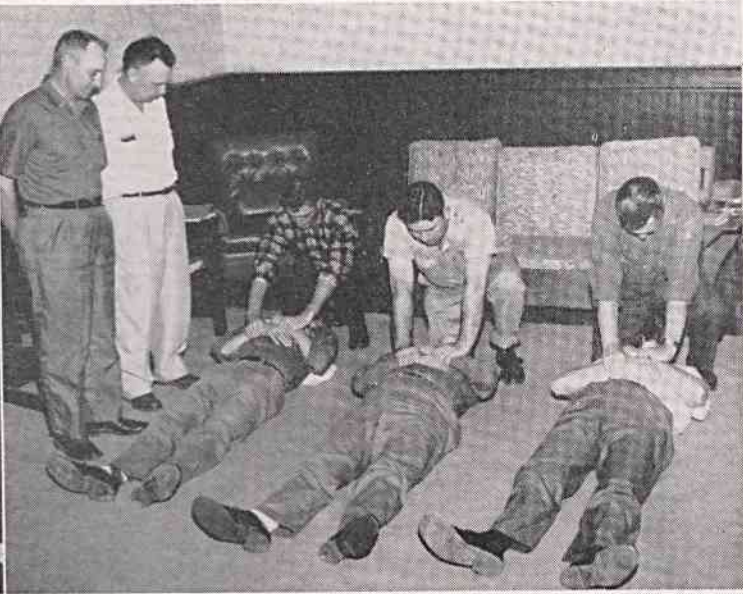

Employees Finish First Aid Training Courses

Thirty-four persons, mainly Fieldcrest employees and Burns guards, have completed Red Cross first aid training courses sponsored by the Leaksville-Spray-Draper chapter of the American Red Cross and the Medical Department and Safety Department at Fieldcrest Mills.

Red Cross first aid certificates will be issued to 15 enrollees who completed the advanced course and to 19 who completed the standard course. The certificates will be presented as soon as they are received from the American Red Cross.

O. Franklyn Griffith, of Winston-Salem, safety engineer for the North Carolina Industrial Commission, taught the advanced course. Val White, of the

Duke Power Company, was instructor for the standard course.

Each course consisted of five two-hour sessions. Classes met at the Consolidated Central Y.M.C.A. on a schedule permitting persons on all working shifts to attend.

In addition to the courses at Spray, the Red Cross standard course in first aid is being given at Fieldale for the benefit of Towel Mill employees. The classes are under way now and will meet at weekly intervals until the course is completed.

Instructors for the Fieldale course are Branton Martin, of the duPont nylon plant at Martinsville, and Jack Whitten, of the Gravely Furniture Company, Martinsville.
