

Bloodmobile To Visit Fieldale October 26

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will make its annual visit to Fieldale Wednesday, October 26. The unit will be stationed at the Fieldale Community Center from 12:00 o'clock noon until 6:00 p. m.

The visit by the Bloodmobile is sponsored by the senior class of Fieldale High School, the Rotary Club, the Lions Club, and Fieldcrest Mills. D. E. Simons and James T. Roach are in charge of recruiting donors in the Towel Mill, assisted by the mill supervisors.

The recruitment of donors in the community will be handled by the high school seniors. With help and advice from Mrs. H. Z. Smith, who has headed the work for several years, the seniors will handle all arrangements on the day of the Bloodmobile's visit.

Seniors To Give Assistance

They will do clerical work, serve refreshments to donors, arrange for transportation, and provide baby sitters for donors who need them.

Through the Red Cross Blood Program, the Blood Bank makes blood available to Martinsville-Henry County people through the Martinsville General Hospital and the Community Hospital at Martinsville, and to the people of the area who go to various outside hospitals.

There is no charge for the blood itself, although the hospitals must make a charge for administering it.

During last year's visit of the Bloodmobile, Fieldale people gave a total of 174 pints, exceeding the community's quota of 125 pints. In October, 1958, when the Bloodmobile visited Fieldale, the people gave 189 pints to set an all-time record for the area.

E. D. Arnold Never Off Payroll In 40 Years

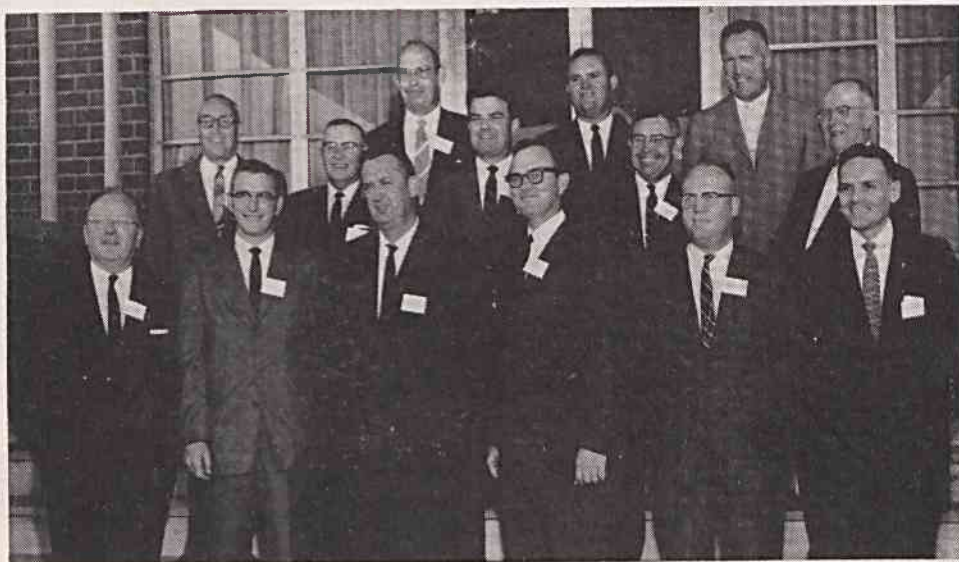

The visitors were conducted on tours of the various plants, the General Offices, the designing departments, and quality control laboratories.

at Fieldale, Virginia, for a dinner with President Whitcomb and other Company officials. Mr. Whitcomb made a brief talk in which he told the history and background of the Company, outlined the scope of its operations, and described our nationwide sales set-up.

The visitors were guests of honor at a luncheon at Meadow Greens Country Club Thursday which was attended by several of the Company officers, Karastan Mill officials, and key men from the staff organization.

Fieldcrest last July purchased the Greenville Mills, Inc., at Greenville, and operates the plant as the Karastan Spinning Division, making woolen spun pile yarn for the Karastan Rug Mill.
