nel; major staff department heads will be co-chairmen.

The goal established for the 1961 campaign represents an approximate 10 per cent increase over 1960 to allow for expanded programs and some increases in costs of operations for the participating agencies.

Among agencies which applied for and got increases were the Draper YMCA, which had \$4128 from the community fund last year and was allocated \$7000 for 1961; Central YMCA which had been receiving \$9600 and will receive \$10,000; the Boys Club of Leaksville which had been receiving \$6185 and is set to get \$7000; Henry Street YMCA, which was granted the largest increase, being stepped up from \$265 to \$1,215.

The Tri-City and Reidsville Girl Scout Councils have been combined with the Greensboro council to form the Piedmont council. Total expenditures of the new council are estimated at \$54,589 for 1960 and budgeted at \$57,275 for 1961. The Tri-Cities' approved share of the 1961 budget is 7.8 per cent of the total or \$4467. There are 325 Girl Scouts served locally by this program.

In Boy Scout work expenses of the Cherokee council are budgeted for an increase in 1961 of \$7,535 over 1960 principally as the result of planned ad-

## Fieldale To Have Its Campaign Same Week

A separate campaign in behalf of the Fieldale Community Fund also will be conducted the week beginning October 17 at the Towel Mill. D. E. Simons and C. P. Wilson, superintendents, are co-chairmen of the drive.

Each employee will be contacted and asked to pledge a minimum of a day's pay. Fieldcrest will collect the pledges through weekly payroll deductions over a 12-month period in the same manner as in the North Carolina mills for the Tri-City Community Fund.

All employees who pledge as much as a day's pay will be eligible to participate in a drawing for a \$50 U. S. Government bond. D. A. Purcell, manager of the Towel Mill, will give a plaque to each department in which 100 per cent of the employees pledge on the day's pay basis.

In last year's campaign, 83.5 per cent of the Towel Mill employees pledged a day's pay or more to the Fieldale Community Fund. Their pledges totaled \$13,255.

Plaques given by the mill manager were awarded the following departments: Carding, Cloth Room, Standards, Dyeing, and Personnel-Lodge-Village.

Under the Fieldale plan, the money raised is used for the Community Fund and other authorized fund drives, including the Heart Fund, Cancer Fund, March of Dimes, and Martinsville-Henry County United Fund.

dition of a field executive. Tri-Cities' share has been set at \$7,500 as compared with \$7000 for 1960. During 1960 the Tri-Cities benefitted from the addition of a field executive, H. R. Boone, in the early part of the year. There are now 15 units in the area with a membership of 291.

The Red Cross is set to get \$6,933—an increase of \$752 over 1960 due to its planned entrance into the Red Cross Blood program and for payment for office costs. The chapter has only one paid part-time employee, Mrs. Grace Armfield, executive secretary.

The Salvation Army is to receive \$5,523, which is \$1,200 more for new maintenance costs of their building, furnishing of playground equipment and additional food for the needy.

The Tri-City Rescue Squad is the only agency which is due to receive less

than in former years. The squad get \$850 for repairs and maintenance of equipment, insurance and operating expenses.

The local chapter for Retarded Children will receive \$1,000 to pay for transportation of students in getting to from their special classes. Should chapter get other monies to meet need, the funds then will go toward the establishment of a class for cable retarded children.

Carolinas United is scheduled to receive \$4,518 for 1961. This is a small increase over the \$4061 received in 1960. Benefitting are the USO, Children's Home at Greensboro, Florence United Medical Research Foundation, North Carolina, North Carolina Association for Mental Health and Carolinas United office necessities.
