## Fieldcrest Man Heads Bloodmobile Project

B. F. Dunton, assistant purchasing agent at Fieldcrest, has been appointed 1961 Bloodmobile chairman for Leaksville - Spray-Draper chapter of the American Red Cross.

He will have charge of all arrangements for a number of visits by Bloodmobile to the Tri-Cities during 1961 as the community begins its participation in the Piedmont Carolinian Regional Blood Program sponsored by the Red Cross.

The local Blood Program was undertaken at the request of the medical staff of the Morehead Memorial Hospital in order that there might be a ready supply of life-saving blood and its derivatives to enable the hospital to better serve its patients.

Under the plan, the Morehead

Morehead Memorial Hospital will be supplied for its total needs and all patients on January 1, 1961, will be eligible for blood supplied through the program.

If 15 per cent of the employees of a company employing more than 1000 persons give blood once each six months, the blood needs of all the employees that company will be met through the Blood Program and no replacement will be necessary.

For companies employing fewer than 1000 people, it will be necessary for 20 per cent of the employees to give blood each six months to qualify.

An individual outside of an employee group who donates blood to the Bloodmobile will receive a card which entitles him and his immediate family dependents to blood as needed for the next six months.

Persons who are not employed by a company participating in the Bloodmobile Credit plan, or who do not hold individual credit cards, will be asked to replace blood used on a pint-for-pint basis.
