The college operates a number of Adult Education classes which meet throughout the county in churches, schools, and other similar facilities. Rockingham Community College also offers a number of Adult Education classes on the community college campus. Students may work toward an Adult High School diploma by enrolling in any of these classes.

The basic principle underlying the Adult Basic and Adult High School programs is educational achievement. Both in the classroom setting and in the Programmed Learning Laboratory, students begin study at their present functional level and progress through a level of 12th grade or higher.

In order to receive an Adult High School diploma, an adult must demonstrate proficiency on a standardized achievement test in English, math, science, and social studies.

In addition to these demonstrated proficiencies, he must also satisfactorily complete four approved elective courses. These elective courses may be chosen from courses offered in the areas of family life, cultural enrichment, vocational subjects, or many other subjects.

Students interested in enrolling in the Adult High School Program should plan to go to the College for initial placement testing on the mornings of Thursday, September 7, and Friday, September 8, at 8:30 a.m. or on the evenings of Tuesday, September 5, and Wednesday, September 6, at 6:45 p.m.

The testing will be done in the Laboratory Building in Room 106. The purpose of this testing is to determine approximate educational levels of entering students. For additional information, contact Dan Moore in the Adult Education Division at Rockingham Community College.
