Mills Make Progress In Waste Reduction

The Karastan Spinning Mill and the Winchester Spinning Corporation are making giant steps toward realization of their waste reduction goals in the current campaigns at those mills.

The Karastan Spinning Mill has a goal of decreasing waste by 13% during the first three months of 1969. The rate of waste reduction through week ending March 9 was a whopping 28%.

The Winchester Spinning Corporation is conducting a similar waste reduction program. The goal there is a reduction of 18% in the three months beginning February 10. The rate of waste reduction through March 9 was 11%.

The tables above show the employees' accomplishments in waste reduction by the various departments since the campaign began.

Various Old Records Can Be Used To Prove Age

Many people delay filing their social security claims because they don't have any proof of their age, according to Charles H. Myers, manager of the Greensboro social security office. In some cases, this causes a delay in receiving their first check. Mr. Myers gave the following advice to help speed up that first social security check.

"First of all, don't delay filing your claim. File early, two or three months

before you plan to retire, even if you don't have proof of your age. Your social security office will be able to suggest some proofs you can use.

"The best thing is to start early in proving your age. You can visit the social security office at any time and discuss what proofs you have and what will be necessary. As a general rule, the older the evidence, the better it is.
