Fieldcrest Sponsors Six In 'Save The Children' Program

Since 1963, Fieldcrest has been giving financial aid to six underprivileged children through the Save the Children Federation sponsorship program. The aim of the Federation program is to help children, their families and communities

all over the world learn to develop their full potential and, ultimately, to become self-sufficient.

Each year Fieldcrest, in the name of the Sales Panel, helps the children stay in school by contributing money which

buys their basic clothing and necessary supplies. Besides the material aid, the children benefit from the friendship and encouragement from the outside world through correspondence with their sponsors.

In turn, the frequent letters from the children to Fieldcrest are full of their gratitude and happiness as well as news of themselves and their families.

Currently the six "Fieldcrest Children" are an American Indian boy and children from Austria, Greece, Finland, Tanzania, and Italy.

Ranked Third In Class

Teopister Issaya was a 15-year-old orphaned Tanganyika girl who could not hope to finish her studies without outside help. She ranked third in her class of 45 students and was able to graduate thanks to the material aid and encouragement provided by Fieldcrest's sponsorship.

When she graduated, the Sales Panel transferred its sponsorship to another Tanzanian child, Theresia Muhumizi. She has just graduated and gone on to a teacher training college and requires no further aid. Now her sponsorship aid has been transferred to Bernadina Paul, also a needy child in Tanzania.

Sirkka Maria Uutella, of Finland, was only seven years old when Fieldcrest undertook her sponsorship in 1963. She lives with her mother, brother, and sister in a tiny two room house in a village 80 miles north of the polar circle. Sirkka could not have hoped to go further than elementary school without the aid of her sponsorship.

Eight-year-old Angelo Sabatini led a bleak life before the Sales Panel began sponsoring him. His mother is dead and his father, after emigrating to Switzerland in search of work, maintained little contact with the child, who was cared for by an aunt. Although Angelo's aunt treated him like one of her own children, there were days when her meager wages could not provide food.

The fourth child who receives Fieldcrest's aid is Artemis Alonistiotou, of Corinth, Greece. The family's income

NCF Christmas Float Winner Of Two Trophies
