

Congratulations To Recent College Graduates

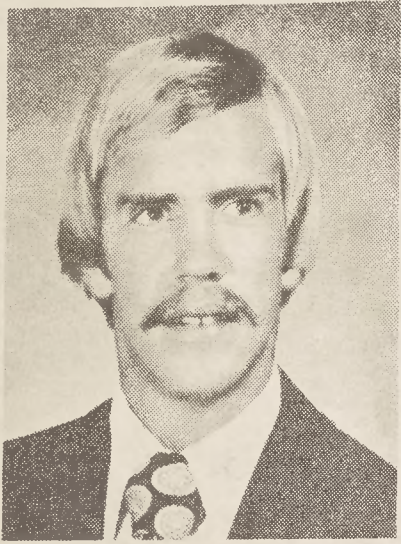

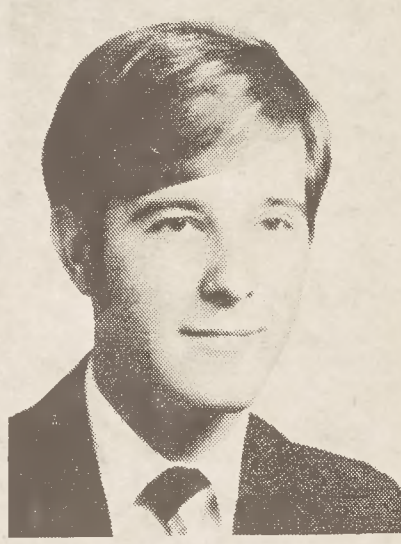
Ronald Alfred Hall received a B.S. degree in business

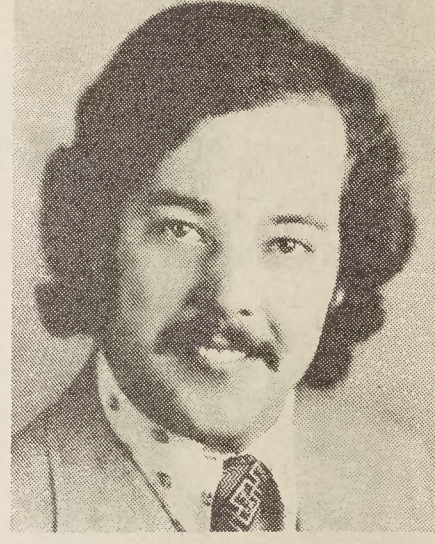

High School Grads

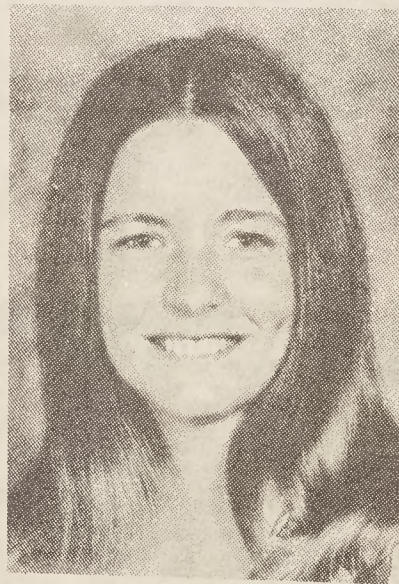
Congratulations to the following sons and daughters of Fieldcrest employees who have recently graduated from high school.

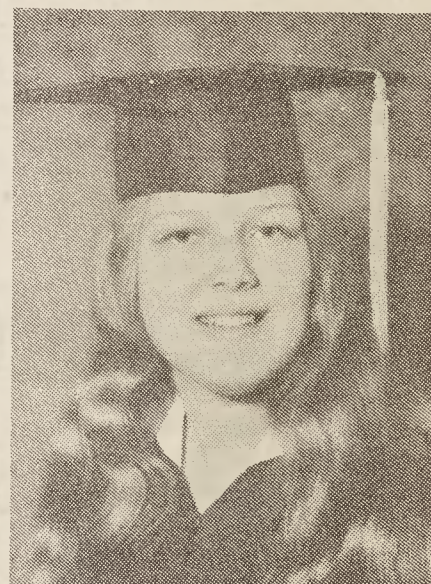
Brenda Sue Bowen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Bowen,

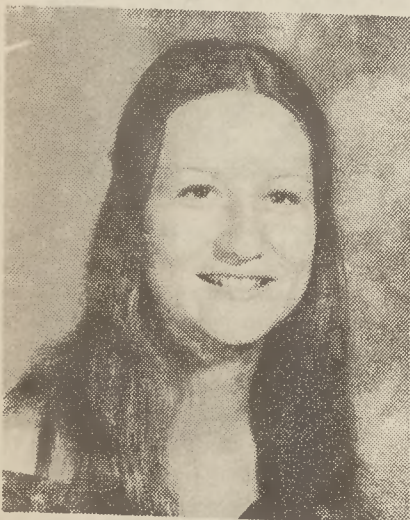

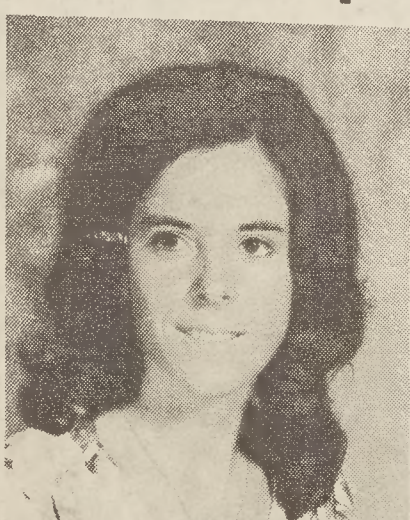

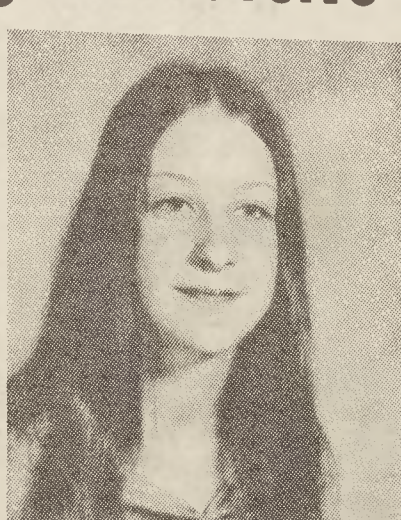
