machinery and tools, the proper physical positions and movements are to be transferred satisfactorily from one mind to another, especially through face-to-face communication, it must be assured that the message is adequately delivered, received, absorbed, and retained. The latter concept of retention for subsequent use as opposed to mere exposure to facts is a vital ingredient of learning.

Two-Way Communication

Since that first well-known face-to-face encounter in the original Eden when the snake - successfully demonstrated the powers of the art of persuasion, the value of two-way interchange (including full appreciation for the consequences) have become more evident to us. Meaningful conversation includes response - instantaneous feedback - something more than simply asking "do you understand". That is, why is it essential to wear goggles when twisting wire or cutting metal straps? Why is

it essential to heed posted and verbal warnings to avoid a slippery floor? Why is it essential to stop-off machinery when cleaning gears or threading rolls? And why is it essential to seek assistance in moving a load excessive in weight for one person? (The preceding are typical of all the 120 or more serious accidents that occurred in the company during the first ten months of 1974).

If our safety program in 1975 is to be increasingly successful in preventing human and economic losses from personal injury and property damage, the lines of communication between and among all levels of our organization must be opened early, kept open, and frequently checked for effectiveness. The final measure of our overall performance will depend directly on the job we do of selling each other on the need (1) to be attentive (to instructions and spontaneous danger signs), (2) to exercise the patience in giving and receiving instructions, and (3) to hold in high regard the point of the original instruction.
