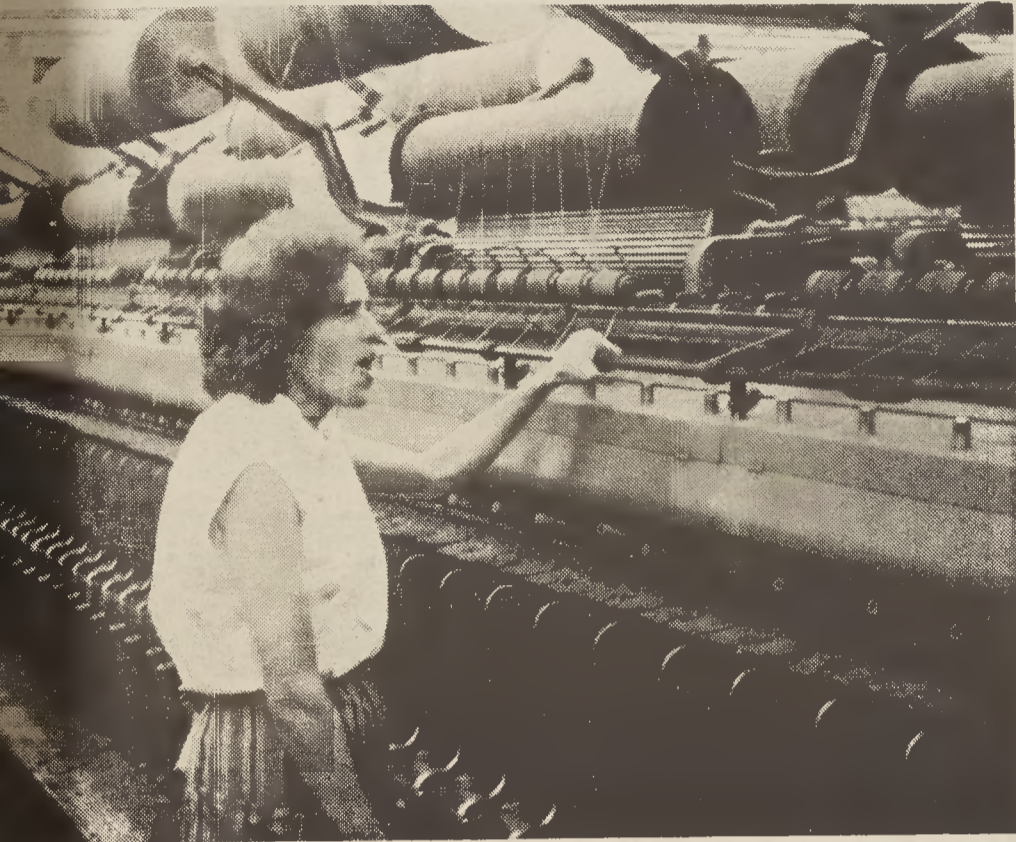

In order to purchase rugs or carpets, active employees must obtain an authorization form No. WO-13 signed by their immediate supervisor. Retired employees will need to have the form signed by the area personnel manager at the location where they had worked.

Employees in outlying locations may choose rugs and carpets from swatches obtained from the area personnel manager. Employees may pick up the merchandise from the service center if they so choose. However, should they desire to have it shipped, they must pay commercial rates.

Use Care With Jumper Cables

cable to the positive terminals.

5. Connect one end of the other cable to the negative terminal of the good battery.

6. Connect the other end of the second cable to the engine block or frame (not to the negative terminal of the weak battery) of the car with the weak battery. Avoid making the final connection to a fuel line, cable or accessory.

7. Make sure that all connections are firm before starting the engine of the car with the good battery.

8. Start the other car and

disconnect the cables by reversing the above steps.

The preceding information was furnished by the National Safety Council and confirmed by a local automotive expert. It is endorsed by the Safety Department in an effort to eliminate yet another employee health hazard — the little sleeping power pack under the hood of your car.
