Mr. Redd, a bale opener in the Carding Department, was opening a compressed bale of cotton. When he cut one of the bands a piece flew off and struck his safety glasses. The metal frame holding the lens was broken and the lens knocked out. Mr. Redd's eye was not injured.

"I'm thankful I was wearing my safety glasses," he said. "I know I would have lost my eye if it hadn't been protected. Nobody has to remind me to wear my safety glasses while I'm working."

The Fieldcrest Safety Department has nominated Mr. Redd for membership in the Wise Owl Club, of America, a national organization composed of industrial employees whose eyesight has been saved by the wearing of safety glasses.
