second hand before entering supervisory training program March, 1974. He had been a foreman in the Beck Dyeing Department since July, 1971.

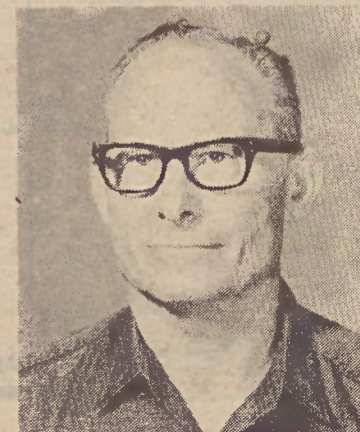
