Couple Has 84 Years Of Service

When Columbus W. (Bill) Tulloch retired from the Bedsread Mill on October 1, he and his wife Irene, had a total of 84 years of continuous service with Fieldcrest.

Mr. Tulloch had 41 years at retirement while Irene Tulloch when she retired in May of this year had 43 years of service at the Bedsread Mill.

Both say they are enjoying retirement. "We've worked a long time and now it's time to relax," said Mrs. Tulloch. Both plan to spend more time with their gardening, which they both enjoy.
