K. William Fraser, Jr., vice president-finance and treasurer of Fieldcrest Mills, Inc. and other company officials participated in the signing ceremony at the North Carolina National Bank in Charlotte.

Mr. Fraser said Fieldcrest had utilized bond financing to underwrite a \$4.8 million plant expansion in Alabama and a \$1 million expansion in Georgia. He said the NCF project was the company's first to utilize bond financing for pollution abate-
