At the end of 1977 these employees had worked a total of 341,616 safe hours with 6,328 average hours per employee. The last lost-time accident was in March, 1975.

Melvin Moore, division vice president and general manager, Greenville Spinning Mills, sent each employee a letter of congratulations. "The real winner in a safety record like this is each and every employee who has not had to bear the pain, loss of time or earnings, nor dismemberment of fingers, hands, etc., as a result of serious injury, he said.

The employees were treated to a chicken and barbecue dinner in honor of their outstanding achievement in safety.

"I have worked in three yarn mills since I have been with Fieldcrest," said Mike Strother, plant manager, "and I have never seen a better safety attitude than the attitude expressed by the employees of this plant.
