

No More "Liquor Toting."
Roanoke, Va., Feb. 24.—The Norfolk and Western Railway today issued an order to become effective February 26, prohibiting passengers from carrying containers of liquor into West Virginia at between points in that state. Refusals of persons to give up such possessions, the order continues, will necessitate confiscation of liquor by the nearest station agent.
