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3(pts.) x 3(hrs.), and that is 18 points. When added they equal 54 points. Divide this by the total number of hours (15) and you end up with a 3.6 grade point average.

With the new system, percentages do matter and can either lower your average or raise your average depending on the score. Therefore if one of the A's was actually an A- you would only receive 3.66 points for that class. And if one of the B's was a B- and the other was a B+,

you would receive 2.66 points and 3.33 pts. respectively. With the new scale your final average would 3.53. As you can see there are some disadvantages, but there are also some advantages.
