- You had to come by train at the cost of 50c per passenger and 50c per trunk.

General Regulations:

rain coat, and sweater. All articles of clothing should be marked with owners name. For use in her room she should have a flashlight, tumbler, and a teaspoon.

Students may entertain their friends in the college dinning room at the rate of \$1 a day. Permission must be obtained from the Assistant Dean.

No uniforms are worn, but all students are expected to wear simple, neat, and inexpensive dresses. Cuban or military heals are a necessity for

comfort.

The college does not permit smoking, dancing or cards.
