We take so many

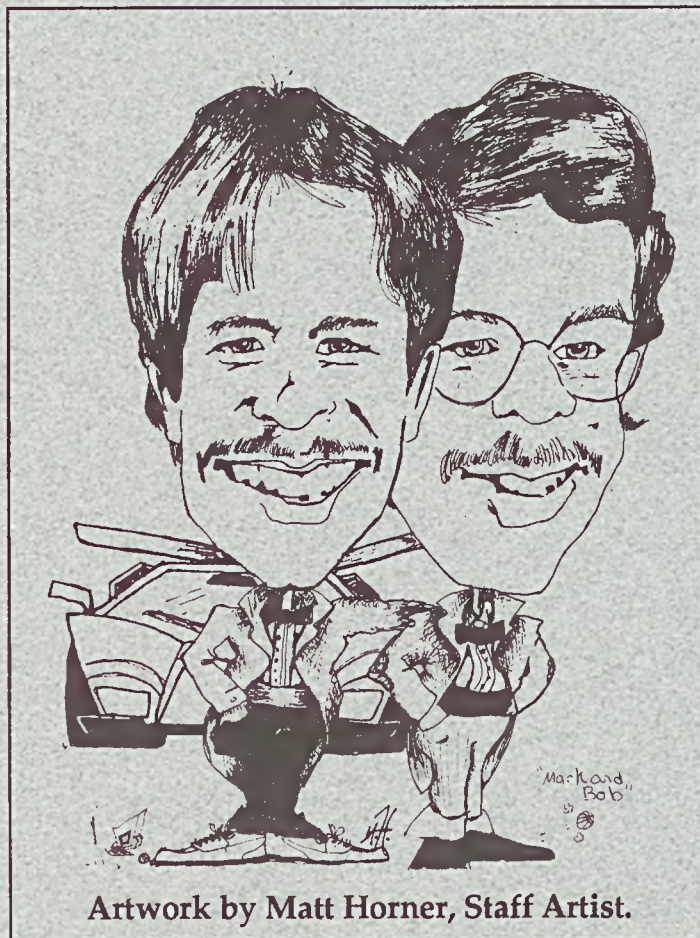
