Presbyterian Peacemakers

The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program recently announced the second annual Global Studies at the United Nations, January 4-21, 1993. This program provides a unique opportunity for college students and others to examine the work of the United Nations and the surrounding international community in New York City. Students can earn three college credits for this study.

Participants will examine peacemaking, peacekeeping and peacebuilding functions at the United Nations through conversations with U.N., diplomatic and non-governmental staff persons. There will also be time to explore New

York City.

Leadership for the program is provided by Dr. Scott Brunger of Maryville College and the Presbyterian United Nations Office. Lodging will be at the Stony Point Conference Center in Stony Point, New York, and the Hotel Bedford in Manhattan.

The cost of the program is \$975, which includes all resource materials, lodging, meals, group activities and transportation to and from New York airports. An additional tuition of \$300 applies to those participants wishing to obtain academic credit for the course.
