Chinese Walnut Chicken
Here's a real taste of the Orient. To serve 6 you'll need:

- 3 large chicken breasts
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 tbs. water
- 1 1/2 tsp. cornstarch
- 6 tbs. soy sauce
- 1/2 tsp. sugar
- 6 tbs. oil
- 3 med. onions, thinly sliced
- 2 slices fresh ginger root, minced
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Rinse chicken and pat dry. Remove skin and bones. Cut chicken into 1-inch cubes and set aside. Mix together eggs, water and cornstarch. Add chicken and toss un-

til thoroughly coated. In small bowl combine soy sauce and sugar. Heat skillet or wok and add 3 tablespoons of the oil. When oil sizzles, stir-fry

chicken for 5 minutes. (Test a piece by piercing with a fork. Chicken is done when juices run clear.) Remove from pan. Add remaining oil to pan and stir-fry onions, ginger and garlic for one minute. Return chicken to pan

and continue cooking one minute. Add soy sauce-sugar mixture and cook quickly until sauce has thickened. Stir in walnuts. Spoon over rice and serve immediately. Crisply cooked snow peas make a perfect accompaniment.
