AT IT AGAIN.

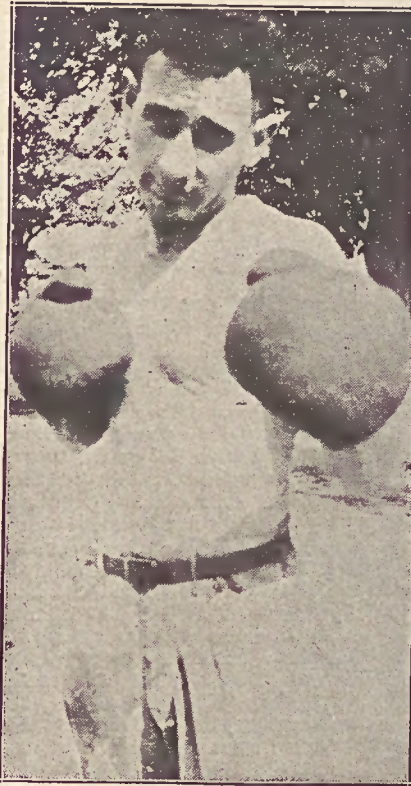

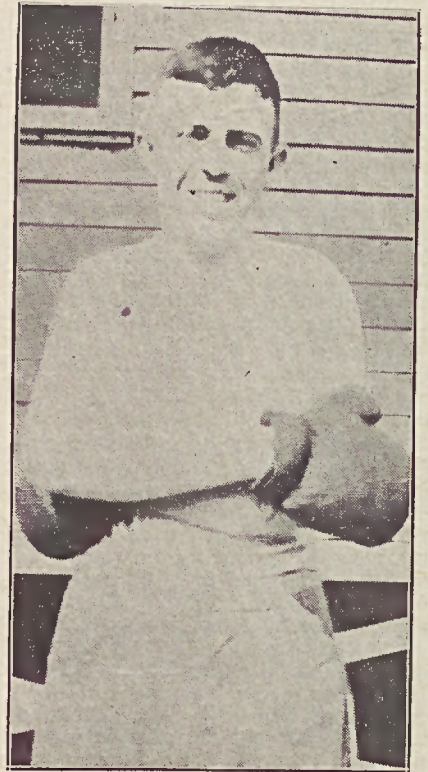
WE HAVE HOPES.
