TALKED ON ECLIPSE.

Prof. J. B.McCall, a professor of science in the Charlotte High School, spoke to the men at the "Y" on Wednesday evening, on the matter of the eclipse of the sun set to occur Saturday at about 3:30 p. m. He gave his hearers much information about eclipses in general, and made some practical suggestions as to what they should look for in the eclipse. The eclipse, he said, will be total in Florida and in Washington but only partial in North Carolina. The eclipse will be more meaningful because of Professor McCall's address. A dashing Douglass Fairbanks' moving picture followed—"The Man from Painted Post." It was much enjoyed.

RE-DIG THE WELLS.

Last Sunday morning Dr. H. O. Nash, Episcopal camp pastor, conducted a communion service at the Y. M. C. A. The prayer book for soldiers and sailors was used. Dr. Nash spoke convincingly on the need for re-digging the wells filled in by the "Philistines." The wells referred to by the speaker were the Bible which the German critical theologians had filled with fable and myth, emptying it of the water of truth and of life for the thirsty soul of man; prayer, rellowship with God, and the Saviorhood of Jesus Christ. Dr. Nash also said that the materialistic spirit of the day was responsible for the filling of these wells. God is teaching us through this war the necessity for re-digging them.

FATHER BETHEL TALKS.

On last Friday, being first Friday of the month, a day of special devotion for Catholies, the Blessed Sacrament was exposed between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m. and 6:30 and 7:30 p. m.

Colonel Archie Miller declared that the soldiers have been petted too much in Amreica but that they will show that they are not "helpes" in action

WORDS OF ETERNAL LIFE.

Dr. Charles L. Jackson spoke on Sunday evening to a much interested audience. His subject was "The Question of the Alternative," taken from Peter's famous reply to the Master's query to his closest disciples as to whether they would leave him as many other had done. "To whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life." Dr. Jackson treated only two phases of this subject: the questions of the whence and the whither of the human spirit; how did we come into being and where do we go after death He said that these natural questions are not answered by science. Science goes a certain distance and then finds baffling mystery; science alone leads only to agnosticism. When it attempts to answer it says man comes from the gorilla and goes to the grave. There is no one to whom we may go but to Jesus Christ for an answer satisfying to our deepest natures: man comes from God and he goes to God.
