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## FRIDAY WAS "FOURTH OF JULY FOR ITALIANS.

The gay flags of Italy floated from three staffs ta Camp Greene on Friday in honor of Italian Independence day. The dignified symbols of green,red, white, and blue, which dangled just below "Old Glory" at the camp library, the nurses home of the base hospital and the base hospital Y. M. C. A. had been made by Miss Marie Fox Wait, the base hospital librarian, who receives the occasion for any form of patroitic demonstration with enthusiasm.

Camp Greene received no notification to keep the day and activities in camp were carried on as usual. There were several dinner parties by the Italian soldiers in the camp however. Camp Greene holds 700 soldiers who are from Italy or first descendents from families who came from Italy.

September, 20 is the anniversary of the occasion when Fredinand marched into Rome and thereby made that province a part of the Italian government and insured a united Italy. The date of the taking of Rome is 1870 and the capture of the city was made possible by the withdrawal of the French garrison because of the activities of the Franco-Prussian war.

There was an inspiration in flags, with their dignified cross of Sevoy and the dark blue border of the Italian coat of arms as the flag of our allies floated beneath our own in the camp. Miss Wait had taken much care in preparing the banners and the result was a work of neatest order. The waving symbol spoke of another unconquerable people who have met the reverses of the great war with a fortitude that means sure defeat when the men of all free lands are banded for the final blow to tyranny.
