STAGG THE COMMANDER

The 117th Ordnance Depot Company is now in command of First Lieut. William C. Stagg.

Lt. Stagg attended the First Officer's Training Camp at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., from May 15th to August 15th, 1917, and received his commission as Second Lieutenant on completion of his course. His first assignment was in the Supply Division of the Ordnance Department at Washington where he remained until Dec. 11th, 1917.

From Washington, he was ordered to the Ordnance Training School at Camp Meade. On Jan. 16th, 1918, Lt. Stagg received orders to proceed to Camp Jackson as Assistant Commanding Officer of the American Ordnance Base Depot in France.

He remained at Camp Jackson until Feb. 17th and was then ordered to Camp Dix as Assistant Commanding Officer of the Ordnance Depot Company. Lt. Stagg received his commission as First Lieutenant Sept 13th, 1918.

Lt. Stagg reported for duty at Camp Greene Oct. 24th, 1918.

ASSUME OFFICE

Second Lt. William R. Fleming has arrived at Camp Greene and has assumed his official duties as Officer in Charge of Warehouses of the 117th Ordnance Depot Company. Lt. Fleming enlisted as a corporal in the 301st Infantry at Camp Devens, Mass., and after serving two months was transferred to the 103d Ordnance Depot Co. Lt. Fleming served here until he was ordered to Camp Greene. He was commissioned Oct. 24th, 1918.
