schools, and the last for the junior high schools. Under each of these classifications are several others. The schools are a second time classified as to enrollment. They are also required to specify as to whether the school is co-educational, male only, or female only.

The score books which act as critics for the papers will be mailed April 15th. Results will be published in the May issue of The Scholastic Editor. The All-American cup winners are to be announced in the June issue.

The magazine, which carries the details of the contest, says of the ratings to be given:

Ratings—Every newspaper en-

tered in the contest will be classified and rated. The ratings will be as follows:

- a. Publications that are superior in every way will be rated All-American.
- b. Publications that are excellent in most respects but which fall short of the All-American class will be given a first class rating.
- c. Publications that are well above average will be rated Second Class.
- d. Publications that are of average merit will be rated Third Class.
- e. Publications which do not make satisfactory use of their opportunities will be rated Third Class.

The issues which THE POINTER entered in the contest were the issues of December 5, November 28, November 21st and November 14th.

**CIVICS CONTEST TO
BE HELD THIS SPRING**

**Prizes Are Two Foreign Tours
and Trip to Capital; Also
Money Awards**

A nation-wide series of high school contests will soon take place in all the civics classes. Prizes considered worth much effort are offered. A most important one sponsored by the News and Observer is oratorical. The subject is "The U. S. Constitution." The time allowed for the oration is ten minutes. It has a national prize of a three month's tour of South America, besides several state prizes. One of these is a cash prize of one hundred dollars; second, fifty dollars, and third, twenty-five dollars. The school contest will be held March 15th; the county elimination contest, March 29; the district, April 15th; and the state, May 11th.

"The Life and Achievements of U. C. Gorgas and Their Relation To Our Health," will be the theme of a composition contest for all juniors and seniors studying civics. The winner from each high school will be awarded the Gorgas Medalion. The first national prize is five hundred dollars in cash and two hundred and fifty dollars for a trip to Washington. The second prize is fifty dollars and the state prize is twenty dollars. The school elimination will be March 1st, the state April 15th, and the national April 15th to May 15th.

The third contest will be in the form of an examination on the League of Nations. Two students from each high school may be entered. The examination will be given in each school on March 15th. The first prize for this is a trip to Europe. The second is one hundred dollars, and the third is fifty dollars.

Miss Lindsay, history teacher of this school, is engineering the contests here, and says that she will be glad to give anyone who desires it any information concerning these three contests.

**MISS MORGAN TELLS
GIRLS THREE MEANS
TO ACQUIRE BEAUTY**

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She must take pains with the following: Good health which brings about good posture and good complexion; dressing your type; good grooming, and wearing the correct costume for various occasions.

In discussing with the girls the problem of dressing to suit the type, Miss Morgan said that each type of girl can be charming in her own particular style: "There is the trim business-like girl, the muscular athletic girl, the very feminine creature who reminds you of ruffled organdie dresses, and the tall calm, well poised girl. The trouble with most American girls and women is that they all want to look too much alike. A certain style is advanced; they all wear it.

"When you go home look into your mirror and find out what your way of being good looking is. What is your size, your coloring, and your temperament?"

"In dressing to suit your coloring, several facts should be borne in mind: colors like styles are fashionable, or 'good this season,' as the salesman's slogan goes; a color is good if it is good for you; and a color's mission is to serve you.

"Good grooming includes nightly care of the skin, and the correct use of cosmetics. Generally speaking, cosmetics are supposed to improve the looks of an individual, and to enhance the natural bloom."

This talk of Miss Morgan's was one of a series of addresses given to the high school girls as a part of the projected work of the girls' council.
