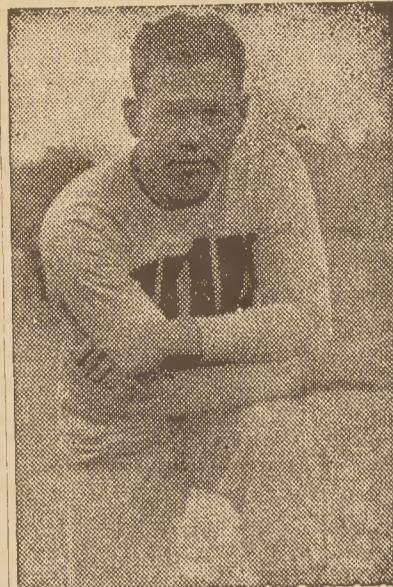
This group of boys have been working hard all season and we should give them the credit due them. Our team has the best chance that a Bison soccer team has ever had in capturing the State championship!
