Schools represented in Greensboro who are trying to adopt a plan for student government in their schools benefited by this conference, in bringing back to their schools new ideas and ideals.



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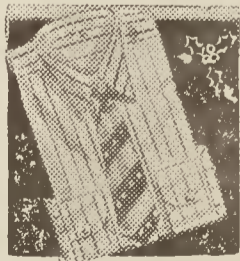
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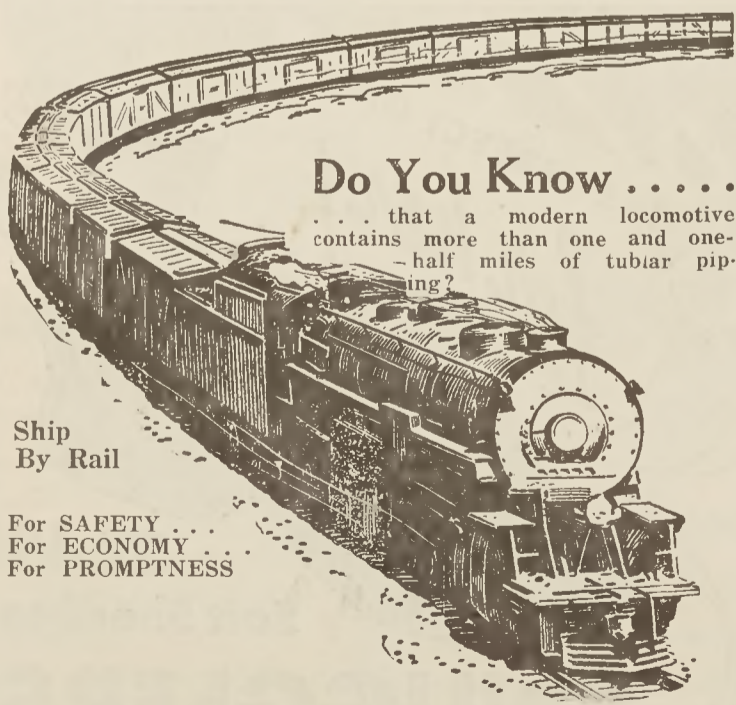
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
