

JOHN J. ROSE OF MEADOW PASSES

The many friends and relatives of Mr. John J. Rose in different parts of the state have been deeply stirred since he passed away at his home in Meadow Township on Saturday, June 21, at 10 P. M. after being sick for several months. He was 78 years old. With the passing of Mr. Rose the county lost a prominent and useful citizen and farmer. He had served his community as a justice of the peace and as school committeeman. For 8 years he had served the county as chairman of the Board of Education. He served as Postmaster of the Overshot post-office from the time it was first established until discontinued on account of the rural free delivery service about the year 1900. He had been a member of the Mill Creek Christian Church since early manhood and had supported the church and its institutions very liberally. He had been very successful as a farmer and owned a large estate at the time of his death. He also held interests in mercantile enterprises in Clinton and Benson.

Mr. Rose was twice married. His first wife was Miss Julia A. Rose. To this union were born seven sons and two daughters, but two sons and one daughter preceded him to the grave several years ago. Those surviving are as follows: A. M. Rose, of Bentonville; J. H. Rose, of Benson; Ira W. Rose, of Rocky Mount; Arthur Rose, of Wilmington, Delaware; John Rose, of Charlotte; and Mrs. Mary Blackman, of Meadow Township; his second wife was Miss Bethany Johnson, who preceded him to the grave several years ago. To this union were born two sons and two daughters, but both daughters died in infancy. The two surviving sons as a result of this marriage are: Lee Rose, of Meadow Township; and Dr. Thurman Rose, of Rocky Mount. He is also survived by 25 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted at the home at 2:30 P. M., Monday, June 23 by Rev. W. O. Henderson, his pastor, after which interment was made in the family cemetery near the home. The Dean of Bible at Atlantic Christian College, Wilson, brought a quartet that rendered beautiful music during the funeral service.

The flower girls and boys were picked from Mr. Rose's grandchildren. They are as follows: Erma Lee, Annie Lee, Elsie Lee, George Lee, Caroline Rose, Jack Rose, Oliver Creech Rose, James Lee Rose, Mary Louise Rose, Winfield Rose, Willie Carol Rose.

The following served as Pall Bearers: Elbert Barfield, Edgar Barfield, Norman Langston, Jasper Rose, Julius Lee.

The large number of beautiful floral offerings showed to some extent the high esteem in which Mr. Rose was held. Whenever any one was in need he was always ready to lend a helping hand. He was a leader of that class of honest, progressive, and substantial citizens that form the backbone of our country and our civilization.

MAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

A wreck occurred on Highway No. 22 near the Four Oaks colored school last Sunday night about 11 o'clock in which one car was almost completely demolished.

The wrecked car, a new Ford Phaeton, was driven by deputy sheriff Brad McLamb, who accompanied by deputy Hannibal Godwin were on duty. Mr. Sloan of Elavon Township to the Johnston County Hospital. Mr. Sloan was said to have shot himself in an attempt at suicide.

The other car, a Chevrolet coupe, driven by Reed Adams of Four Oaks was badly damaged. Adams was alleged to have been driving under the influence of liquor and ran into the deputies. No one was hurt in the accident.

The officers immediately arrested Adams and held him there temporarily, and while they were trying to figure out a way to get him to Smithfield, Elder H. F. Hutchens of Selma came along on his way home and picked them up.

Adams was immediately lodged in the jail on the charge of driving under the influence of liquor. He was released Monday morning under a \$1000 bond for his appearance in Recorder's Court on July 1.

Adams was said to have shot himself with a pistol—one shot through a trench across the side of the car and the other striking under the arm. He is now in the Johnston County Hospital where he is expected to recover.

The attempt at suicide is thought to have been caused by family troubles.
