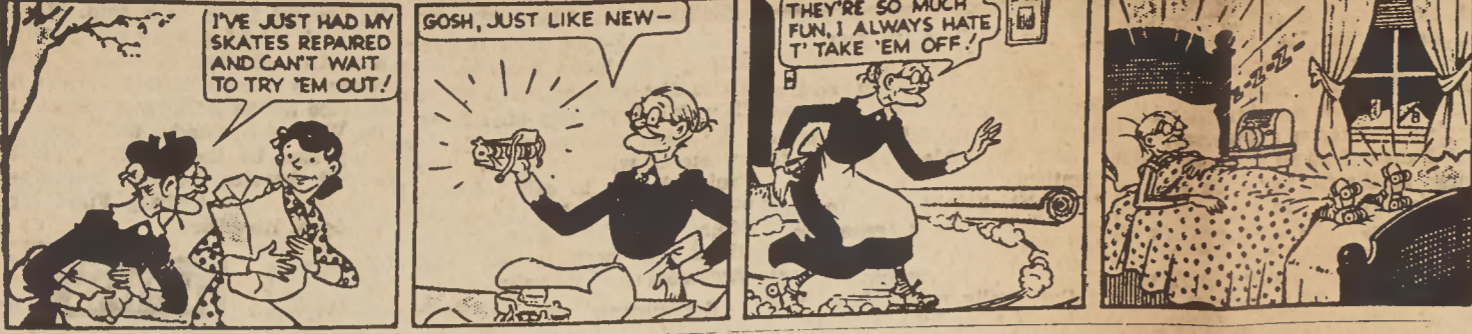

Young Man Fatally Injured In Wreck

John Henry Webb, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Henry Webb of Smithfield, Route 2, died en route to Johnston County Hospital Saturday afternoon from injuries received in an automobile accident about 12:30 p. m. The accident occurred about seven miles from Smithfield on the Brogden Road a mile from the Webb home. Acting Coroner V. J. Underwood, who investigated, said the car, driven by James Murphy of Smithfield, Route 2, skidded on wet pavement and turned around in the road. Webb was thrown from the vehicle which then turned over, crushing Webb's head. Mrs. Louie Baker of Smithfield, Route 2, another passenger in the car, received chest and wrist injuries. She was taken to Johnston County Hospital. The driver received only slight injuries. Patrolman F. B. Trivette of Pine Level assisted with the probe. After consultation with Coroner J. Durwood Creech, who is ill at his home, Underwood said no inquest would be held. The accident was described as unavoidable. Funeral services were conducted Monday at 3 p. m., from the Smithfield Primitive Baptist Church by Elder Shepherd Stephenson. Burial was in Oakland Heights Cemetery. Surviving are his parents, James Henry and Mrs. Julia Strickland Webb, Smithfield, Route 2; a brother, Douglas of the home; five sisters, Mrs. James S. Johnson, Clayton, Route 1. Mrs. Ray A.
