Haddock: "Blast unlikely in Vanceboro"

New Bern explosion leaves 1 dead, 2 hurt

VANCEBORO - William Haddock, plant manager for New Bern Oil and Fertilizer Co.'s facility here said Monday that an explosion of the type which occurred last Thursday in New Bern is unlikely to occur here. The New Bern explosion which ripped a four square foot hole in the eight inch thick concrete wall of a grain elevator leaving one employee dead and two others in critical

condition in Craven County Hospital is still under investigation.

Haddock explained that the cause of the explosion is still undetermined. He added that according to OSHA conditions have to be exactly right for an explosion to occur. Also, the elevator must be in an enclosed area. "Our elevator up here is out in the open," Haddock explained, "It is possible, but extremely unlikely that an explosion could occur here."
