THEREFORE, I, Jimmie L. Morris, Mayor of the Town of Vanceboro, do hereby proclaim April 8-April 14, 1984, as

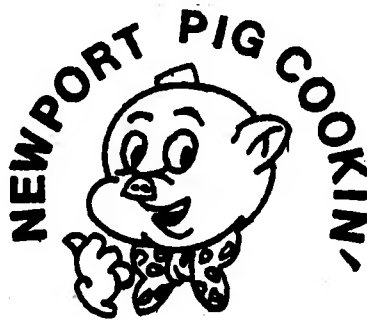
