Ralph Beasley, driver of the truck involved in

the accident was also transported to the hospital where he was treated and released. Mr. Beasley was charged with failing to yield right of way.

Three rescue squads responded to the accident, Rescue 15 of Vanceboro, Rescue 30 of Township 9, and the Advance Life Support Squad from Craven County Hospital.
