The X-ray machine, services of which are under the sponsorship of the North Carolina State Board of Health, was stationed on Hillsboro Street in front of Saint Mary's campus.

All Saint Mary's girls were requested to have X-rays taken during their free periods on the days named. About 250 students, boarding and day, had X-rays taken.

Since many people die every year of tuberculosis not discovered in time to cure it, the Belles adds its grateful thanks to those who made possible the opportunity to further safeguard the health of Saint Mary's girls.

Everyone wise enough to take advantage of this service is to be commended.
