Frances Stubinger gave her certificate piano recital Thursday night, March 18. The program took place in the auditorium before an audience of St. Mary's students and faculty and Raleigh music lovers. The first portion of the recital consisted of Bach's *French Suite in E flat major*, No. 4 and the first movement of Mozart's *Sonata in C minor*. The second portion consisted of two preludes, an etude, and *Waltz in E minor* by Chopin. Her last two numbers were Debussy's *Arabesque in G major*, No. 2 and Ravel's *Sonatine-Modere, Mouvement de Menuet*.

To obtain a certificate from the music department, a music student must meet several requirements. She must maintain a grade of B or better in her technical work; she must practice two hours or more daily; she must have been registered here for at least two years; and she must present a public recital of at least thirty minutes of actual performance time.

Frances, a senior from Chattanooga, Tenn., has studied music for eleven of her nineteen years. Her years of training were evident in the ease with which she played several difficult selections from Chopin and her excellent control over tone in the Bach numbers. When asked for a statement Frances ecstatically replied, "I really enjoyed it. I was nervous at first, but that didn't last long."
