Committee Studies Constitution

Members of this committee for the present school year are Ann Hauser, chairman; Polly Fulkerson; Beverly Bunn; Patsy Frank; Bea Foote; and Mrs. John Cell and Miss Edith Richardson.

The committee is working with the changes suggested by the Elections Committee. One of these changes presented is to elect the Chairman of Legislative Body by the student body in the spring.

The Committee is also considering and studying a petition drawn up by the sophomores. The sophomores would like to have one more representative to the Legislative Body than they now have. This increase means the class would then have the president and two representatives to the Legislative Body.

After the Committee has made definite decisions, these decisions will be presented to the Legislative Body, and if approved, they will be referred to Dr. Stone for final approval. The work of the Constitutional Committee must be completed and submitted to the Legislative Body no later than five weeks before Commencement.
