JUNIORS, SOPHOMORES, AND FRESHMEN ELECT CLASS OFFICERS

On Tuesday, October 16, and Thursday, October 18, the freshman, sophomore, and junior classes at St. Mary's elected their class officers for 1962-63.

The freshman class elected Ann Underwood of Charlotte president and Kinsey Sabiston of Charthage vice-president. Other newly elected officers include Lela Cowardin of Richmond, secretary; Emaly Pemberton from Yanceyville, treasurer; Ann Dorsey Day of Virginia Beach, Va., Legislative Body representative; and Candy Carr of Durham, dance marshal.

Heading the sophomore class will be Susan Spaulding of Chase City, Va., who held the position of vice-president of the freshman class last year. Backing her up will be Winborne Shaffer of Chapel Hill, former Legislative Body representative who will serve as vice president this year; Gretchen Bullard of Wilson, who was president of her class last year, will be its new secretary. Ann Hoover Smith, a Raleigh girl, will be treasurer, and Ann Richert, also of Raleigh, will be the new dance marshal. The sophomore representative to the Legislative Body is Perry Grimes who hails from Lexington, N. C.

Diane Ricks of Jarrett, Va., was elected by both the freshman and sophomore classes to be the underclassman representative to the Honor Council.

In the election last week Roses Watson from Columbia, S. C., was elected president of the junior class. Roses has been at St. Mary's for the past two years. During that time she was a member of the Beacon, publicity chairman of the Young Republicans Club, and treasurer of the Doctors' Daughters Club. The new vice-president, Alice DuPre, is another old girl. Alice comes to us from Mt. Pleasant S. C. Last year Alice was a MU Cheerleader. Martha Weeks, the new secretary, and Claire Garden, the new treasurer, are both new to St. Mary's. Martha is from Rocky Mount and Claire hails from Kenbridge, Virginia. Betty Gee Herndon and Eleanor Stowe are the junior members of the Legislative Body. Both new girls, Betty Gee is from Henderson while Eleanor is from Charlotte. Ann Hundley, a member of last year's May Court, will be the junior dance marshal this year.

Watt and Lovell To Come To St. Mary's

St. Mary's will have its next program on Nov. 1, 1962, Hannah Watt and Roderick Lovell present their dramatic program, "Men, Women, and Love" at 8:30 P.M. in the auditorium.

This acting pair, husband and wife in private life, dip into the treasure chest of English Literature and history to offer diversified entertainment. From their extensive dramatic repertoire, they range widely through excerpts from such masters of the classical drama as Shakespeare, Sheridan, and Shaw to that modern comedy playwright, Noel Coward.

Their program also includes such dramatic selections as a letter of proposal from Henry VIII to Anne Boleyn and her subsequent reply to him while she was awaiting execution for infidelity. These two excerpts, juxtaposed for dramatic effect, make a poignant contrast.

From history, Hannah Watt and Roderick Lovell draw on such stirring moments as a speech by Queen Mary I denouncing a rebellion against her proposed marriage to King Philip of Spain. They include Queen Victoria's letter of sympathy to Mrs. A. Lincoln. There is also an amusing bit about an English comedian meeting George Washington.

This acting duo have scored successes in Britain and on the Continent with their polished dramatic performance of Tolstoy's "The Kreutzer Sonata." When they appeared here at the Maidman Playhouse in New York in 1961, the New York Times called them "a brilliantly accomplished pair." In Paris, Dublin, Rome, and elsewhere in Europe they received praise for their dramatic skills, versatility and ability to entertain.
