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Legislative Body Revised

The Legislative Body is the instrument through which student self-government is promoted at St. Mary's It is composed of Student Government officers, faculty advisors, and class representatives who consider petitions and constitution-

al changes.

All students may not be aware of the tremendous changes the Legislative Body has made since last year. The Legislative Body of the Past has consisted of one large body which met together and discussed all business together. It was brought out last year that at this type of meeting the body spent much time discussing various petitions before they could agree on any course of action. The Legislative Body felt that a lot of time was wasted by not having a clear picture of petitions before they met and by bringing up impossible petitions at the meeting. They discussed this problem at great length and finally decided on a tentative solution.

The Legislative Body, this year, has been broken up into three committees: the Constitution Committee, the Policy Committee, and the Petitions Committee. These committees meet separately to discuss the various problems which arise under their jurisdiction, and then the Legislative Body meets as a whole to discuss the findings of one

of the committees.

The Constitution Committee, with Verna Gillam as chairman, is active in matters concerning any changes in the Constitution of the school. This committee consists of Haynes Walker, president of the Student Government; Ann Day, freshman representative; Susan Spauling, president of the sophomore class; and Eleanor Stowe, junior representative. The advisor of this

this committee is Miss Lineberry. The Policy Committee acts on those petitions which do not pertain to social matters. Headed by Mary Stella Leak, this committee consists of Gee Canada, president of the senior class; Diane Gould, representative of the commercial class; Betty Herndon, junior class representative; and Mary Roper, chairman of the Handbook Committee. This division of power is expected to save much time by relieving the whole body of unnecessary petitions and is expected to help organize the meetings by having the committees present their views on their respective petitions.

Once a petition reaches the Legislative Body, it must again be passed by a two-thirds majority.
