Student Government at St.

Mary's is based on an Honor System in which every girl is responsible for her own actions. When she comes to St. Mary's, each girl takes an Honor Code Oath in which she pledges herself to maintain the highest standards of personal integrity and to cooperate in fulfilling her responsibilities as part of the student government.

It is only when a girl fails to live up to this responsibility that the Honor Board is necessary.

The Honor Board is composed of student and faculty members, and its duties are to consider violations of the Honor Code and to take action to maintain the high level of student conduct.

The meetings of the Honor Board are secret for the protection of the students involved, but the cases are presented to the student body after the Honor Board reaches a decision.

After considering a case the Honor Board can acquit the student, issue a warning, suspend, or expel her. All decisions of the Honor Board must pass by a 2/3 majority vote, one vote of which must be that of a faculty mem-

ber.
The President of the College
must approve any action of the
Honor Board before it goes into

effect.

The Honor Board is a student oganization for the protection of the students and the high standards at St. Mary's. The Honor Board asks the cooperation of the entire student body in keeping these standards high.

GRANTS GIVEN TO RALEIGH COLLEGES

Last April six colleges announced the formation of CRC—"Cooperating Raleigh Colleges" in order to provide interinstitutional cooperation.

The Southern Education Foundation in Atlanta provided a grant of \$10,000 to augment the cooperative program which was started in the fall of 1967 by a grant of \$7,500 from the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation.

Class and library exchange and other programs shared by these schools will be offered to Peace, St. Augustine's, St. Mary's, and Shaw University in the 1968-69 school year.

Dr. John Yarbrough, chairman of the Department of Biology at Meredith was named the head of CRC for the first year. Dr. Yarbrough said the possibilities of this program can be extended to exchanging students, faculty members and physical facilities.

In October 1968, IBM gave \$10,000 to further help CRC. The money was presented by Arthur I. Becker, IBM general manager in the Research Triangle Park to Dr. Yarbrough.

Some of the goals of the CRC are more opportunities for class room and other study exchange by students, establishment of exchange professorships, a cooperative program of international studies, joint calendar and schedule programming, and seeking of further joint supporting grants for the consortium. This cooperation is hoped to eventually lead to a development of new academic minors.
