YOUNG DEMOCRAT'S SUPPORT CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S FUND

This year the Young Democrats Club's attention has been focused on one little boy. Through applying to the Christian Children's Fund, an organization which gives aid and guidance to unfortunate children all over the world, YDC members were able to "adopt" a child. The Christian Children's Fund has a list of over 80,000 children: each child is an innocent victim of some kind of tragedywar, disaster, no parents, and many other destitute conditions. Through a sponsor's aid a child is helped to escape from a life of poverty and misery.

Our little boy is named Ching-Po, and he lives in Taiwan. Ching-Po, whose father is dead, lives with his mother who is in poor health and cannot work to support her family. Although the Christian Children's Fund provides orphanages for many children, the Family Helper Project was used in Ching-Po's situation. The purpose of the Family Helper Project is to keep the family together and to give a child an opportunity to live in his own home in an atmosphere of family love.

Ching-Po was born on March 1, 1958. From his personal information story it was learned that he is now in the sixth grade, and his favorite subject is Chinese. His health is fair and progress is good. He has the chores of washing dishes and sweeping, and his favorite game is dodge ball.

The Young Democrats Club gives twelve dollars a month in support of Ching-Po. In general, the child receives food, clothing, medical care, education, and school supplies. The most important aspect of the aid is that it gives Ching-Po an opportunity to grow up under his mother's care.

To continue our support of the child we must raise one hundred dollars this year. During the next months there will be candy sales held for this purpose. We would appreciate your help.
