(St. Robert, MO., Home of Fort Wood & the Army Engineers) — "MAIL CALL!" are two words which are music to the ears of just about everyone who wears our country's uniform. Remember how it was on the M\*A\*S\*H reruns? Concerned Americans from coast to coast joined forces last Christmas through a program with the same name ("Mail Call!") and brought smiles to more than 125,000 of our servicemen and women, many of them young people away from home for the first time.

"Mail Call!" combines greetings from thousands of members, resorting all the cards and letters into more than 900 bundles which are sent priority mail (nobody here has funds for airfare to fly around personally distributing mail!) to units and activities in more than 40 of our 50 states as well as to the four corners of the globe. Some members have received responses from every continent. The twin goals are to include mail from many people and places in each outgoing

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
