That plunge beneath the running waters was like a death; the moment's pause while they swept on overhead was like a burial the standing event once more in air and sunlight was a species of resurrectiou. Nor did the likeness reside only in the outward rite, it extended to its inner significance. To what was it that the Christian died? He died to OLD SELF, to all that he had been whether as Jew or Gentile, before he became a Christian. To what did he rise again? clearly to that NEW LIFE to which the Christian was bound over. 


