North Greenville and Spartanburg are seeded as tourney favorites, but the rest of the teams aren't going to play dead. Mars Hill holds wins over two of the top three teams in the conference—Spartanburg and Brevard.

The Lions have had a rugged season coming out on top in five of the twelve games they have played. Two of the members of the team gained honorable mention for the All-State cage team. Chosen for this honor were guard Bobby Robinson and forward Wayne Godshall.

At the end of the scheduled games of conference play North Greenville was in the lead slot, with Brevard and Spartanburg tied for second. Lee's-McRae, Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, and Asheville-Biltmore then follow in that order. Asheville-Biltmore has won but two games through the entire season and there is the possibility that these two games may be forfeited. The team is guilty of the infraction of a conference rule and the question is to be voted on by members of the conference before anything is decided.
