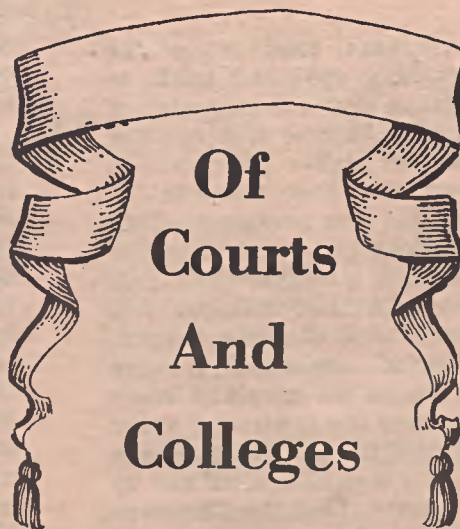

STUDENTS AT NORTHERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY FAIL TO OVERTURN DORMITORY REGULATIONS. Poynter v. Drevdahl, No. M31-71CA2 (USDC WD Mich. N. Div. 72). In 1970, the Board of Control of Northern Michigan University adopted regulations requiring all single undergraduate students to live in University dormitories except those over the age of 23 and those residing with parents or legal guardians in the Marquette area. Students challenged the regulation, claiming that it violated their rights of travel, privacy, education, association, etc. The court disagreed, holding that the regulations were neither arbitrary, capricious, nor discriminatory.
