team had a 22-10 record, advanced to the NAIA District 26 playoffs, won the Augusta College tournament, and was a finalist in the WBTV Carolina Classic. Our soccer team finished with a 16-5 record, advanced to the NAIA District 26 finals, and ranked fifteenth in the Southern Poll. The tennis team's record was 13-4. The women's volleyball and golf team were not as successful. With the growth in women's enrollment, further programs in women's athletics need to be introduced.

In 1978-79, Belmont Abbey College was especially blessed with generous volunteers and investors who, together, realized in gifts to the College a total of \$645,364.15, including the following categories:

This magnificent record was realized through the cultivation of major donors and through broadening the base of alumni support. Daily I thank God for these responsible stewards who share with us the good things God has given to them.

BUSINESS AFFAIRS

In the area of business affairs under the direction of

Mrs. Kathy Drumm, the College completed the year netting a surplus budget of approximately \$4,400.00 in a budget of \$3,000,343.00; this is the third consecutive year of surplus of income over expenditures. Another accomplishment was a ten (10%) percent reduction in total short-term liabilities, as well as thirty-six (36%) percent reduction in short-term notes payable; this was accomplished through an increase in gifts and through the cooperation of faculty, administrators, and employees in adhering to proposed budgets. The net surplus in current operating, endowment, and Centennial funds stands at \$661,395.00, a forty-six (46%) percent increase over last year's net surplus. There was an emphasis in the routine maintenance of the physical plant-with some special attention to Saint Leo's Hall which included wall painting, resurfacing of floors, and renovation of rest rooms. One of our problems continues to be controlling the consumption of energy, especially natural gas, due to the nature of our central boiler system and the lack of the thermostatic controls. In addition to significant contributions to our community life, auxiliary services, including dormitories, food service, and bookstore, showed a net profit of \$46,985.00.

In December the business office replaced its manual accounting system with an NCR 8150 computer. At the end of the fiscal year, the machine was processing the accounts payable, general ledger, and budgeting func-

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tion. A new office of data processing was established to service the data processing needs of the various departments of the College. The office of student financial aid did an outstanding job counseling our students and their families regarding financial aid matters; nearly seventy-five percent of our tuition dollars comes through some form of aid program.

At the end of the academic year, Mr. J.P. Smith retired after serving nearly twenty-five years with the College as teacher, business manager and treasurer. His many contributions to the business affairs of our College are greatly appreciated.

CONCLUSION

Now you can appreciate the multiple manifestations of the Lord's presence in the success story of Belmont Abbey College 1978-1979. Many persons have contributed to the growing success of our College. I am sincerely grateful to each and every one of you. May your generosity be richly rewarded, both on this earth and in Heaven!

Distribution Management Program Receives \$20,000 Donation From Trustee

Belmont Abbey College's **Distribution Management Pro**gram has received a \$20,000 gift for use in funding scholarships for students enrolled in the program.

Donor of the gift is Mr. George L. Wrenn, president of Wrenn Brothers Carolina, Inc., Charlotte. Wrenn was instrumental in starting the program in 1974 and continues to play an active role in its development. His overall goal for endowment for scholarships for the program has been set at \$100,000.

Wrenn has been a member of the college's Board of Trustees since 1976, when it became possible for the first time in the history of the college for lay men and women to serve as Trustees. He previously served on the Board of Advisors (1973-76) at the college.

The Distribution Management and Materials Handling Program at Belmont Abbey College is perhaps the only program in the United States which approaches the concept from a management, rather than engineering, perspective. The curriculum includes not only courses in distribution management and materials handling, but also transportation, cost accounting, budgeting, personnel and industrial relations, and business organization and administra-According to Dr. Bill M. Kirk, P.E., chairman of the Department of Business and Economics at B.A.C. and head of the Distribution Management Program, the four-year program is designed to prepare students to enter the field of distribution as management trainees. Students completing the program are awarded the Bachelor of Science degree. The program was recently highly praised by the father of a 1979 Distribution Management graduate. His letter is included

in the following article which is reprinted from the second quarter 1979 edition of "Material Handling Distribution," the official journal of the Material Handling Equipment Distributor's Association (MHEDA).

"Efforts by MHEDA and other supporters of the **Distribution Management Pro**gram at Belmont Abbey College, Belmont, North Carolina, are starting to pay dividends.

"The most recent evidence of this success came in the form of a letter from MHEDA member John M. Prest, Prest Equipment Co., Plymouth, Minnesota, whose son Bob was among the graduates of the Distribution Management Program.
