Eanes passed to Clark. who went over for the first score of the season. The kick for the extra point falled.

In the third period Lexington traveled to the Asheboro 30 where the oval was lost on downs. Asheboro punted to the Lexington 45. Williams carried the oval for another first down. Jimmy Johnson carrying the pigskin went to the 1 and Gibson went over for a touchdown. Newell kicked the extra point.

The game almost over, Asheboro had possession of the ball on their 15 yard line; Fry passed and "Chub" Wilson, center, intercepted the ball and carried it over. The game ended as Newell again kicked the extra point. Lineups:



Lexington Meets Salisbury In Scoreless Opener

The Lexington High Yellow Jackets opened their '46 season on Wednesday night, September 18, with the Boyden High Yellow Jackets of Salisbury. Although several scoring threats were displayed neither team was able to carry the pigskin over the goal. Probably one of the greatest number of spectators ever to witness a local football at the Holt-Moffitt Stadium here with an estimated attendance around 4,000. This was the first of the seven home games for the locals with three out of town grid games.

In the beginning of the first period, Lexington drove to the visitors' 16yard line, where the oval was lost on downs. Salisbury had their best chance for a score in the first quarter when they recovered the ball in Lexington's territory, but their plays stopped clicking when Jimmy Johnson intercepted on the Lexington 11. Lexington running out of downs, Williams punted to the 48. Eanes intercepted on his own 18, but their plays were stopped by the Salisbury line.

In the second quarter Lexington made two close threats by Williams and Thomason, but the ball went back to the opponents due to the lack of downs.

In the final quarter Williams tossed two nice passes to Pete Clark, good for some 50 yards. Gibson carried the ball and was nabbed by the last man
