Class Song "Reminiscence"

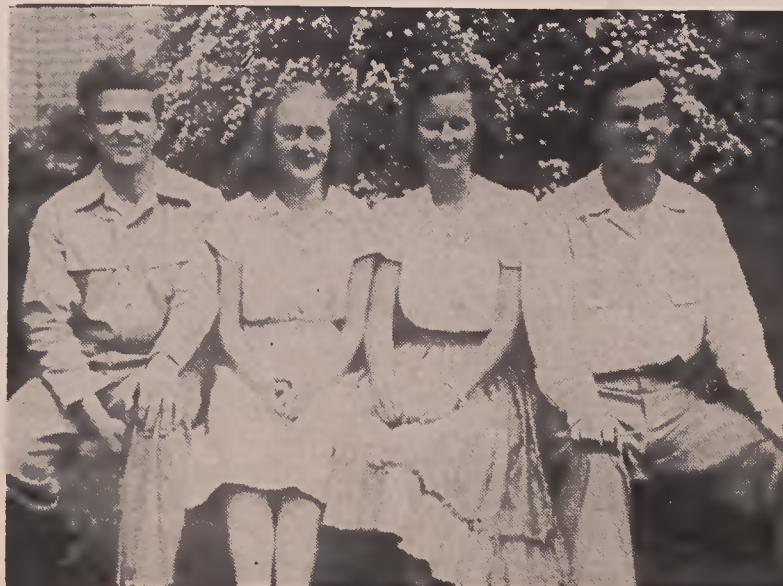
